- 2. A letter has come through just today by email from Seanad Eireann, encouraging groups to get involved in the construction of gardens of remembrance, and stating that the Tidy Towns unit has confirmed that there may be extra points awarded for the creation of commemorative gardens in this year's National Tidy Towns competition. There are some template designs by Diarmuid Gavin provided, but it is also acceptable to re-dedicate an existing garden. A guide to the creation of the gardens is available. Email me if you want it.

# Gardens of Remembrance and Reflection: designed by landscape artist Diarmuid Gavin Points as part of Tidy Towns competition for installation of these gardens

You may remember in 2016 many counties, towns and parishes installed Gardens of Remembrance. Following on from this very successful initiative and as we continue our decade of commemorations, I am again working alongside landscape artist Diarmuid Gavin on this initiative with the support of Minister for State Pippa Hackett and all the leaders of the groupings in Seanad Eireann are supporting the Gardens of Remembrance and Reflection.

Please find attached a brochure for this initiative as well as a letter from the Tidy Towns Unit within the Department of Rural and Community Development. The Tidy Towns unit have stated that under this initiative, Tidy Towns committees may be in a position to gain points within the competition from these gardens.

Diarmuid Gavin has designed seven template gardens and may be named after women involved in the journey for independence. These garden designs can be replicated, altered or amended in any way deemed fit or indeed a completely different design can be used depending on the location. All these Gardens of Remembrance and Reflection should have three elements in common

- A replica of the 1916 proclamation
- A flagpole for the tricolour a
- Seven threes which represent the seven signatories of the proclamation

As many people were involved in the journey for independence during those years a century ago, it would be appropriate that the proclamation alone would be the only inscribed words in these gardens.

These gardens would be exempted from any need for planning permission by the below regulation

Exempted development, planning and development regs-

Class 33

Development consisting of the laying out and use of land—

- (a) as a park, private open space or ornamental garden,
- (b) as a roadside shrine, or

The area of any such shrine shall not exceed 2 square metres, the height shall not exceed 2 metres above the centre of the road opposite the structure and it shall not be illuminated.

I would appreciate if you could share this information with community groups, tidy towns committees and others in your county. If they have not already installed a Garden of Remembrance as part of the 1916 Centenary commemorations, they might consider installing a Garden of Remembrance and Reflection in their area. Communities who have installed either garden may wish to officially dedicate or rededicate their gardens on the 11<sup>th</sup> of July this year to mark the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the truce during the War of Independence.





#### 7. Our Heritage Section has been busy – A new Heritage Plan, and a Wetlands Action Plan.

There's going to be a lot of activity around wetlands on account of the focus on Climate Action. Expect funding to be pumped into projects which look at re-wetting low lying areas, and carbon sequestration (eg, planting trees, re-wetting bogland).

We'll be holding a webinar later in the year for you but in the meantime, tis no harm to get a jump on the topic and start thinking about what you could be doing. There could be BIIIIIIIG marks in it for groups which are located near marginal lands!!

#### County Monaghan Wetland Action Plan 2020-2021

The County Monaghan Wetland Action Plan 2020-2021aims to develop an integrated plan for the conservation of the wetland resource in County Monaghan, through co-operation and engagement with a wide range of partners and community groups.

As part of this project, the 202 sites for which standard survey information is available thanks to past wetland surveys in the county, will be evaluated in relation to the multiple benefits (ecosystem services) that these wetlands provide.

A web app developed as part of the Monaghan Wetland Action Plan project shows the location of these wetland across the county, and allows local groups and interested parties see the results and outcome of the project. 

- Pre-historic archaeology / Passage graves and cairns.

- Vernacular and traditional buildings.
- Demesnes and estates.
- Historic Graveyards, holy wells and church ruins.

- Indigenous knowledge and traditions.
- Cross-border heritage.
- Irish and the vernacular English.


